ACADEMIC EXTENSION & ENRICHMENT PROGRAM



Within the Creative Communication pathway, students will explore various modes of communication including creative writing, multimedia productions, visual representations and oral presentations. This pathway encourages students to embrace their individual strengths, extend their imagination and encourages diverse, divergent and unique thinking in response to various philosophical scenarios.

From Year 7 to Year 10, students will engage in innovative challenges, both individually and collaboratively, through English, Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences classes in conjunction with co-curricular opportunities.

COURSE SELECTION & TIMETABLES

On entry to this program, students will be accelerated through the Western Australian Curriculum in English and Humanities and provided time to engage in challenging activities that aim to develop creative and critical thinking to a high standard. There will be regular challenge sessions throughout the program including an afterschool component.

- Year 7 students selected for the program will be placed into a special English and Humanities class. They will also be selected into a special Visual Design class.
- Year 8 students will continue with English and Humanities classes along with an extension class in current Media and Drama.
- Year 9 and 10 students will continue with their English/Literature and Humanities programs. They will also enjoy the opportunity to select courses in:
 - · Communication—presentation
 - Drama
 - · Media— radio, TV, podcasting, film, VR
 - Visual Arts

Along with the subject based curriculum, students will engage in visits with guest presenters and authors, attend off-campus facilities and participate in co-curricular activities. Co-curricular activities are a compulsory component of the program. They give students opportunities to explore passions more deeply than can be covered in the regular curricula offering.

ACADEMIC EXTENSION & ENRICHMENT PROGRAM



Within the STEM pathway, students will engage with experimentation, coding, environmental issues, bio and physical sciences, robotics, mathematical reasoning, materials and systems design. This pathway will extend their thinking in each of the disciplines and enrich their understanding of the world by taking them beyond the individual disciplines of Science, Mathematics and Technology through an interdisciplinary approach to develop them as future innovators.

From Year 7 to Year 10, students will engage in activities within real-world contexts through Mathematics, Science and Technology classes, in parallel with co-curricular opportunities.

COURSE SELECTION & TIMETABLES

On entry to this program, students will be accelerated through the Western Australian Curriculum in Mathematics and Science and provided time to engage in challenging activities that aim to develop 21st Century thinking skills. There will be regular STEM challenge sessions throughout the program including an afterschool component.

- Year 7 students selected for the program will be placed into a special Mathematics and Science class. They will also be selected into a special Digital Technology class.
- Year 8 students will continue with the same offering as in Year 7 along with an extension class in Materials Design.
- Year 9 and 10 students will continue with their Mathematics and Science programs. They will also enjoy the opportunity to select courses in:
 - · Electronics and Robotics
 - · Digital Game Design and Coding
 - Engineering
 - · Technical Design Drawing and Modelling.

Along with the subject based curriculum, students will engage in visits with guest presenters, attend off-campus facilities and participate in co-curricular activities. Co-curricular activities are a compulsory component of the program.

THE PROGRAM

The aim of the program is to

- Develop individual skills
- · Develop team skills
- Develop skills in refereeing, coaching and statistical analysis
- Provide opportunity to participate in state, national and international competitions
- Conduct basketball related fitness testing and develop programs to improve individual fitness levels.
- Video analysis of individual skill performance and team structures
- Understand the physiological and skill requirement for basketball at an elite level
- Undertake Sports Medicine Australia training programs including first aid and injury prevention and management.
- · Provide information relating to diet and nutrition

COURSE SELECTION & TIMETABLES

Students in this program in Years 7-8 do not attend general Physical Education classes. If numbers allow, Year 7 students will be divided into separate girls and boy classes. Year 8 - 10 students are in a mixed class twice a week for a maximum of two hours a week. Staff also offer before and after school opportunities for further development of skills.

In Year 9 and 10 students are able to select other options including classes in The Arts and Technology areas.

Please be aware that enrolment in a specialist program will limit the number and type of options available in Years 9 and 10. This is due to timetabling constraints and is therefore non-negotiable.

SPECIALIST MUSIC PROGRAM



The Department of Education Approved Specialist Music Program promotes the development of the whole child and provides children who enjoy music the opportunity to be part of a student group with similar interests and talents.

The highlight of the music program is the 13 music ensembles for students to participate in including; four wind orchestras, two jazz bands, choirs, classical guitar ensembles, a percussion ensemble, smaller instrumental ensembles and a rock band. There is an annual lower school music camp, senior music tour, local school concerts, performances as requested by local groups and organisations, as well as the major Term 3 concert.

The program accepts students from beyond Woodvale's local area. It's size and performance opportunities make the program unique in the Northern corridor. Over 250 students access the program, allowing for comprehensive classroom and ensemble opportunities. This provides students placement in ensembles most suited to their abilities.

Students in the specialist music program study one of the following;

Continuing instruments: flute, clarinet, trumpet, trombone, percussion, classical guitar and voice,

Beginner instruments: oboe, bassoon, alto saxophone, french horn, euphonium, tuba, percussion and voice.

AUDITION PROCESS

Students will need to audition for the program by performing one piece on their selected instrument as well as their rendition of a popular song. This demonstrates their ability to sing in tune. If a student is auditioning for a place on a new instrument, there will be no requirement to play that instrument. They will need to sing only.

Students accepting a place in the program are expected to continue to study music to the end of Year 10 as a minimum. They can then choose to continue their music studies, either through ATAR music or Certificate courses in Music Industry.

COURSE SELECTION & TIMETABLES

Year 7 students are enrolled in two hours a week of class-based Music for a semester and also enrolled in two hours a week of Visual Art for a semester.

Years 8, 9 and 10 students complete two sessions for a maximum of two hours a week of Class Music for the whole year. This is the whole timetabled Arts provision for Year 8 students. Year 9 and Year 10 students have other optional course choices and they are able to select other Arts courses for example Drama, Visual Art or Media.

All music students are also required to attend out of hours ensemble rehearsals and a small group instrument lesson once a week in school time. It is compulsory for all Year 7 students to attend weekly junior choir rehearsals.

Please be aware that enrolment in this specialist program will limit the number and type of options available in Years 9 and 10. This is due to timetabling constraints and is therefore non-negotiable.
